SAFETY FRAMEWORK

To promote a safe and enjoyable environment for all SPC members and visiting paddlers when using Club and Personal assets during Club sanctioned paddling sessions including SPC organized races.

Safety Equipment - Club Canoes

Club **OC6 & OC3** canoes MUST have the following Safety equipment on board. It is BOTH paddlers' & steerers' responsibilities to check before launch!





MANDATORY for **BOAT**

- 1. Life Vests for each paddler on Board
- 2. Club Safety Bag
- 3. Bailers
- 4. Tow Rope
- 5. Lights, if paddling before dawn & after sunset

MANDATORY for **STEERS**

- 1. Whistle
- 2. VHF Radio (best for emergencies) or
- Mobile phone (locked to SG operator, as a backup)



Safety Bag System for OC6s, OC3s

Safety bags need to be filled before and emptied after each session to allow both kit and the inside of the bag to dry (if you can't close it properly (2)).

Each bag must have these items inside:

- 1. 2 x field dressings.
- 2. 1 x ziplock bag of four rubber straps,
- 3. 1 x vacuum sealed bag with two rolls of tape
- 4. 2 x rope. PLUS, you take a long rope from the wicker basket that is placed near by >DON'T put the long rope in the safety bag.

PLEASE:

- 1) **Respect the system** and keep it tidy and ordered....it's there for YOUR safety
- 2) **Respect the kit**....there are 8 safety bags and 8 complete sets of kit to go inside. Don't nick items for your own use...that's just crappy and lazy.
- 3) **Respect your club mates**....a number have spent time and effort setting this up....for YOUR safety.







Safety Equipment - Single & Double Crafts, SUPs





MANDATORY

- 1. Leg Leash
- 2. Life Vest
- 3. Whistle
- 4. VHF Radio (best for emergencies) or
- 5. Mobile Phone (locked to SG operator, as a backup)
- 6. Spare paddle
- 7. Lights if paddling before dawn & after sunset

Recommended

- Safety Bag
- 2. Tow Rope

RACES

Mandatory Safety Briefing BEFORE each Club Session

By: Coach, Designated Session Leader, Race Organizer For OC6s and Single Craft paddlers

Checklist

- 1. Identify leader of each group
- 2. Provide Tide & Current Info
- 3. Alert if any Paddler has Medical Condition
- 4. Pairing of Single Craft Paddlers Buddy system
- 5. Set separate Course for each Group as necessary
- 6. Agree on stop points e.g. at Channel Crossings
- 7. Designate an experienced Sweep Canoe if inexperienced / rookie paddlers taking part
- 8. VHF Channel announced & set (VH71/72)
- 9. Lights for Dawn / Dusk Paddling

Mandatory Safety Briefing BEFORE each race

By: Race Organizer For OC6s and Single Craft paddlers

Checklist

- Safety Briefing showing course and incident management
- 2. Review incident management processes
- 3. Deploy Safety Boat and Sweepers
- Race Officials communication via VHF Radios + Base
 Station. Use Mobile Phones as backup comms.
- Officials to check each racer's safety equipment and craft




Safe way of getting through blue barrels



Small crafts, please give way to bigger crafts!



NO-GO Zones: Keppel & Harbourfront



Areas close to Keppel Fairway & Harbourfront are OFF-LIMITS!

Note that all areas marked as "... Fairway" on these maps are shipping lanes.

You have NO RIGHT OF WAY versus ferries, container ships, tug boats, etc. Stay close to the islands/shore when paddling near Fairways.

Check traffic in both directions before crossing. This is especially important in the channel between Sentosa and the Sisters Fairway, where high-speed ferries run.

Vessels can approach much faster than you realize. When in doubt, wait for the vessel to pass and double-check your clearance before attempting to cross a fairway.

Incidents at Sea - Escalation Protocol

With **injury** or **life threatening** situation

- Session leader
- Police Coast Guard or Port Marine Safety
- Safety Team / Exco

Without injury or canoe is out of control and poses a danger to others

- Session leader
- Port Marine Safety
- Safety Team / Exco

Equipment/canoe damage, other incidents

- Session leader
- Ops Manager and Head Coach (if club equipment)
- Write note detailing damage on White Board



Incidents at Sea – Communication Procedure

If you are stopped by the MPA (Marine Port Authorities) on the water, please remain calm, courteous and cooperative, exercise patience and caution - you are directly/indirectly representing SPC.

When contacting the Police Coast Guard, Port Marine Safety or Marinas for assistance, please follow this procedure:

- 1. State that the vessel type is "Paddling Canoe"
- 2. Provide your name
- 3. State the nature of the emergency
- 4. Give them your exact position
- 5. Follow any instructions given by the officer taking the call

Remember to notify the SPC Exco as soon as it is <u>safely</u> possible to do so.
